They go toward the lagoon; when the girl opens eyes she is in a rich palace. The girl's father searches for her in vain. One morning he sees her on the banks of the lagoon beautifully dressed. He tries to catch her but she flees into the lagoon. The priest tells him to lasso her. He takes her to the priest who prays for her, but she escapes and returns to the lagoon.

She remains silent for three days. With drops of water she disenchants the city and all inhabitants. The boar becomes a prince. He marries the girl and invites her parents to live in their palace.
