A grateful snake gives a man the power to understand animal languages [B350, B491.1,

B165.1, B216], and tells him that if he reveals the secret, he must die [C425].

Once the man hears animals talking and laughs. His curious wife insists on knowing why he

does so [N456]. Worn down by her nagging, he is about to give in and tell her [T253.1]. Then

he hears a rooster say how easily he rules his many wives, while the man cannot rule even his

one wife [N451, B469.5, T252.2]. The man keeps his secret and does not tell her anything. Cf.

Types 517, 671, and 673.
